
#### **METHODOLOGY**

- National survey done in collaboration with EVITARUS and Ambit 360, with survey administration by SRSS
- ► LA component (n=212), within larger national survey (n=1,168)
- Field Dates: Jan. 19 March 4, 2022
- NFF collaborated closely with PBI and CGLA on the LA component
- Partnered with advisory and two nonprofit feedback committees
- All charts refer to LA component only, unless otherwise noted



# RESPONDENTS REPRESENTED ALL LA COUNTY SERVICE PLANNING AREAS




#### MOST ORGANIZATIONS PROVIDE DIRECT SERVICES




#### MAJORITY OF LA LEADERS ARE BIPOC



## BIPOC-LED NONPROFITS TEND TO HAVE SMALLER BUDGETS RELATIVE TO WHITE-LED NONPROFITS



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

# MEETING DEMAND DURING THE PANDEMIC HAS BEEN DIFFICULT


As a result of COVID, 72% of LA nonprofits reported a significant increase in demand


Fewer than half reported being able to meet increased demand between FY2019-2021

Nearly half of organizations do not believe they will be able to meet continued demand for services in 2022









# WHITE-LED NONPROFITS CONDUCTED DEI PRACTICES AT HIGHER RATES SINCE 2020







# ONLY A QUARTER OF BLACK-LED NONPROFITS REPORT HAVING RESERVES




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




# LA WAITS LONGER TO BE REIMBURSED BY GOVERNMENT COMPARED TO NONPROFITS ACROSS THE COUNTRY



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
